April 4th, 2021 Easter Sunday – Email/At Home Missal

A blessed Easter Sunday to you, and thank you for joining us for worship, whether by print, email or Zoom. In the course of Holy Week this year, not only have we walked with Jesus through Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday ... we have also moved from Stage Red to Lockdown in Ontario, and so once again we are plunged into a different kind of isolation, and perhaps fear.

This is not unsuited to the journey we begin today which is the Easter journey. During Lent, our journey to the cross, we studied a series of stories and articles about homelessness in tension with our faith. You will receive with this service a final story in the fictional story series, which we will study together during the liturgical season of Easter. But for today, we will be more contextual in looking very specifically at the Easter morning gospel story, of women arriving at a tomb to dress a dead body, and encountering an empty tomb.

The First Reading: Isaiah 65:17-21

For I am about to create new heavens and a new earth: the former things shall not be remembered or come to mind. But be glad and rejoice forever in what I am creating; for I am about to create Jerusalem as a joy, and its people as a delight. I will rejoice in Jerusalem, and delight in my people; no more shall the sound of weeping be heard in it, or the cry of distress. No more shall there be in it an infant that lives but a few days, or an old person who does not live out a lifetime; for one who dies at a hundred years will be considered a youth, and one who falls short of a hundred will be considered accursed. They shall build houses and inhabit them; they shall plant vineyards and eat their fruit. [NRSV]

The Second Reading: Revelations 21: 1-7

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

"See, the home of God is among mortals.

He will dwell with them;
they will be his peoples,
and God himself will be with them;
he will wipe every tear from their eyes.

Death will be no more;
mourning and crying and pain will be no more,
for the first things have passed away."

The Holy gospel according to Luke 24:1-9

C: Glory to you, O Lord.

But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, the women went to the tomb bringing the spices which they had prepared [to finish anointing the body]. And they found the [large, circular] stone rolled back from the tomb, but when they went inside, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. While they were perplexed and wondering about this, suddenly, two men in dazzling clothing stood near them; and as the women were terrified and were bowing their faces to the ground, the men said to them, "Why are you looking for the living One among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how He told you, while He was still in Galilee, saying that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinful men, and be crucified, and on the third day rise [from death to life]." And they remembered His words, and after returning from the tomb, they reported all these things to the eleven [apostles] and to all the rest. [The Amplified Translation]

The Gospel of our Lord. *C: Praise to you, O Christ.*

Message (Imagine Pastor Janaki's voice here ©)

With the announcement of lockdown coming in the midst of Holy Week preparations, I considered re-using last year's Easter Sunday message, because in some sense it felt to me like we had not moved much farther away from where we were a little over a year ago, when the pandemic began to impact us here in Cambridge, and our church had to be closed.

But then, I listened to the song we will sing for our Hymn of the Day today, a brand new song written by a colleague of Brad's, Rev John Oldham, with melody written by Brad. And in my inbox today was another new song, another new Oldham/Moggach collection. And I browsed through our YouTube channel and saw how much new content we have produced during this year ...

I read through last year's service, when the pandemic lockdown was just five services old, and everything was being delivered in print and email only ... and I thought about how we worked our way through safety protocols, to re-open our building for worship for six Sundays in the Fall. I thought about how we have figured out our own St Peter's way of worship on Zoom, where we can see those who gather, and we can sing together – something we could not do in with our pandemic safety protocols in church, and I thought, no ... it is not true to say we have not moved forward.

I thought about how many of you who are worshipping today, whether by print, email or Zoom have already gotten a first vaccine, and others are registered to receive one. About how we had a combined ZOOM-mail-in AGM, and how we had difficult discussions at that AGM, yet had them well — and I felt it would be a denial of God's own faithfulness to us to be caught up in the fear, depression and anxiety of lockdown. Because, today, Alleluia, Christ is Risen.

Christ is Risen indeed, Alleluia.

The Risen Christ leaves behind an empty tomb. And because nature abhors a vacuum, something must sweep in to occupy that empty space. And if we are not sure what ought to sweep in, what is sweeping in, what has swept in for millennia of God's faithful people, we only need to look to the scriptures to understand how God's faithfulness is not only foretold but experienced and witnessed through the trajectory of time.

Our three readings today span millennia ... Isaiah speaking of a time of exile, when God's faithful people are promised restoration to their own lands from which they have been forcefully expelled by the power of a conquering empire.

It may feel to us at times that COVID-19 has been like this – a force that has been so powerful it has had its way with all of life as we know it. And it has certainly changed so much in our world. But it has not removed our faith, and it has not obliterated our love of each other ... we demonstrate this love every time we safe distance, every time we hand wash, every time we put on a mask.

Just as the Babylonian troops did not conquer the faith and spirit of the Israelite people, so we also will our faith and spirit survive the assault of a pandemic.

Our second reading, from Revelations, speaks not of a time in history, but a time in the future ... a time when God will create for us a new heaven and a new earth, because the former things have passed away. A time in which God dwells with mortals ... sounds like God is in our homes, wait a minute ... God is in our homes © For here we are, worshipping at home today ©

We may feel a sense of grief and loss about not being able to worship in our sanctuary, but by no means has God been far from us ... in fact, quite the contrary as so many of you have told me how, during this pandemic time, you have felt God's presence in a differently intimate way.

So this Easter Sunday:
What are we really doing?
What are we really celebrating?
What are we really mourning about?
What are we really looking forward to?

The women go to the tomb, in the Gospel of Luke reading, to dress a dead body with spices. This was a means of forestalling the stench of decay which is normal when a body has died. When they get to the tomb, the find the big stone covered its entrance rolled away, and the tomb is empty.

Is our sanctuary still a sanctuary when it is empty of our bodies?

Is our grief about missing "church", the building, the tradition formed by doctrine about loving God with all we have and all we are?

Or is this grief like the grief of the women who carry spices to dress a dead, decaying body that is no longer there?

For none of us can deny that Jesus has walked with us all through this pandemic; none of us, even those of us who have experienced the hand of mortal death taking our loved ones away ... perhaps especially those of us who have lost loved ones would have to agree that God has found ways to be with us – in our homes, with our loved ones, with our community who found different ways to extend the God-fingerprinted loving-kindness to us.

Christ is not in the tomb. Jesus is risen – and if we, like the women encountering the empty tomb – were to share a story of witness, what would that story be? What would the centrepiece of the story be?

Would it be about death spices we were not able to apply to a decaying body?

Or would it be about the wonder of a tomb we find empty, and the possibility, the opportunity, the hope that emptiness represents?

Is our Easter story about filling our world with the witness and story of God's abundance in salvation, through death and resurrection? Or is our story about death and that empty space where a dead body once lay?

These are important questions to ask in third-wave, variant-evolving, vaccine-hesitancy times ...

What is your story of Easter? How do you come to the empty tomb? How will you witness to this day, when we celebrate: Christ is Risen indeed?

What does your Easter religion look like??

I point you to our resurrection hymnody for some ideas.

Because our faith story does not end here.

We look to a new heaven and a new earth that emerges from this pandemic earth, from the empty tomb.

Amen.
