Today our focus scripture is Mary's Magnificat.

Sarah praying ...

Let us pray together, in the presence of God, as we meditate on this period of waiting and preparing for the coming of Christ,

saying "May our souls magnify the Lord", and all responding "Hear our prayer.

This year has brought many unpredictable challenges. We ask for your strength to help us continue to navigate this pandemic.

We pray that we have the faith and patience of Mary so that we might experience hopeful anticipation instead of fear.

We know that our bodies are dwelling places for your divinity and we are blest to be your servants. We pray that your spirit works through us bringing to fruition great things. May our souls magnify the Lord. R: Hear our prayer.

Where do we find Mary, and where in her experience do we find ourselves?

This year has felt like a year of waiting ... waiting for lockdown to finish ... waiting for church to re-open, waiting to see what would happen with schools, waiting for decisions to be made ... waiting for vaccines to be developed ... waiting and waiting and waiting.

The waiting that happens during pregnancy is a very different kind of waiting ... often when we are waiting for something, someone, an event -that which we are awaiting is outside of ourselves. But as, as we approach the third week of Advent, we join in a completely different kind of waiting ... we join in waiting for the coming of Jesus.

In the account given in the Gospel of Luke, the first miraculous pregnancy that is spoken of is not the pregnancy of Mary at all, but that of her elderly cousin, Elizabeth. They were a righteous couple, Elizabeth and her husband Zechariah, but Elizabeth is barren, and so they have no children. Whilst Zechariah is doing his temple duties one day, the angel Gabriel appears to him and foretells the birth of their son, who is to be named John, and who is to "make ready a people prepared for the Lord."

This same Gabriel visits Mary, six months into Elizabeth's pregnancy ... and he lets Mary know that she has been chosen by God to bear the Son of God, who will be named Jesus. This is a very strange occurrence ... for Mary is a virgin, and engaged to be married! It would be unheard of for a faithful Jewish woman to be found pregnant before her marriage ... but Mary puts up no objections ... quite the contrary – she expresses her willingness to serve God ... this is how a barren elder and a virgin come to be with child!

Both Mary and Elizabeth find their bodies to be the dwelling places of God's narrative alongside their own narratives ...

For Mary: alongside being about to get married - never ever having known a man,

For Elizabeth: alongside the long married life of, no doubt having tried, but not having been able to be conceive...

Alongside these, their own narratives, these women join the narrative of God, and the inevitable waiting that accompanies pregnancy ... As we wait in these COVID times, experiencing so many of the worries and anxieties of these unusual times in bodily ways – where are we carrying God's narrative in our bodies? Is it in our hands and feet? Our hearts and minds? Our eyes and ears? How are we waiting to see what God will bear forth?

Mary waits by visiting, and celebrating in song ...

Mary goes to visit Elizabeth, now big with child, and as Elizabeth hears Mary's voice, the baby in Elizabeth's womb, the one who will become the locust eating baptizer, John, he leaps in his mother's body. Mary begins her song of celebration and joy and thanksgiving as she encounters Elizabeth ...

(singing the Magnificat ...) My soul does magnify the Lord; my spirit sings of God my Saviour, for he has looked with love and favor on his lowly servant.

From this day all will call me blest, From now through all the coming ages. The Lord has done great things for me and holy is his name.

Sarah praying ... We pray for the humility to think of ourselves less in this time of great need. We pray for the essential workers, the unemployed, the houseless, those experiencing food scarcity, those who cannot be with their loved ones, those who are sick, and those who are living on the margins of society. We pray for the students and staff at Martin Luther and Laurier, all of their families and loved ones, and those we long to hold again.

We trust that You are with us always and we commit to serve you and give you thanks by serving one another.

May our souls magnify the Lord. R: Hear our prayer

As we await the coming of Christ, where do we encounter God's mercy and strength? What is the encounter with God for those who find themselves "lowly"?

Mary's song of celebration goes on to expound on the nature and dispensation of God's mercy ... those who love, and those who are willing to serve are identified as the ones who are touched by God's mercy ...

Imagine this woman, she is not royalty, she is engaged to marry a carpenter, in a time where virginity was expected at the threshold of marriage ... yet her humility is such that she is able to recognize this embodied Spirit occupation in her womb as an act of service with God ... she is able to see this unrequested visitation of conception as an act of love with God.

One might think the mighty God of Abraham, Isaac and Moses would choose someone well known, someone with title, someone from a wealthy family to bear God's offspring ... but God finds the suitable vessel in this most humble of women ... the proud are scattered in their conceit.

By bringing God's flesh into the virgin Mary, the divine demonstrates a preferential option with the untitled, the poor working class, God lifts up the lowly, God fills those most hungry for the bread of life from the inside out with good things – God chooses from the poor, while the rich, or more accurately those who, in their pridefulness think they have it all - they are sent away empty ...

(singing the Magnificat ...)

His mercy touches those who love, and those who serve one another. And with his great strength he has scattered all the proud in their conceit.

He cast the mighty from their thrones, And he has lifted up the lowly. He fills the hungry with good things while others turn away.

Sarah praying ...

Lord we know you search for those who seek your love. We are here seeking your forgiveness, blessings and protections so that we may forgive, bless and protect those who need your love the most. We ask that you journey with us as we prepare our hearts, minds, bodies, and souls in this advent season for the coming of our salvation.

Help us to remember when we cannot see the way that you have given your only son to save us and we can find peace in the spirit of Life and Truth.

May we use all that we are and all that we might be to serve and praise you.

May our souls magnify the Lord. R: Hear our prayer.

To whom does the divine infant come? And why is he sent to be in our midst?

Divine memory is not wanting: God remembers the commitment made to Abraham and the commitment made to the children of God – I will be your God, and you will be my people.

God searches for those who seek God's love – searching them out, and finding them – blessing them, walking amongst them, forgiving them, protecting them.

It is to these, the humble and faithful people of God, that the divine infant comes ... the saviour of our world, Spirit of life and truth.

Through the servitude of Mary, God enters the world of flesh, establishing Godself in our midst, bearing hope and truth and light into everything, into fear, into hopelessness, into poverty of body and spirit,

This was true in Mary's time, and it is true today ... The truth of God's presence with us lasts throughout time ... It is indeed cause and reason: to use all that we are, all that we have and all that we might be capable of to magnify our Creator, and praise God forever more ...

He comes to all who seek his love, For he remembers the promise That he had made to Abraham and to the children of God.

All glory be to God on high, And to his Son, God the Saviour And to the Spirit of life and truth that burns within our hearts.

The main wording of the prayer below came from a Thanksgiving message sent out by the Interim Executive Director of the Cambridge Shelter Corporation, Anne Tinker, in an email to staff and volunteers. Anne's message was not worded as a prayer – but her words sounded prayerful and appropriate to me. It captured so well the many things we have to be thankful for, that, with some additional intercessions, edits and Anne's permission I share some of her words in our prayers today.

A Thanksgiving Prayer:

All-powerful God: You bless us in countless ways,

Thereby showing your authority, your grace, your mercy and your boundless love.

We are thankful for the many blessings you give us:

We are thankful that we can turn on a tap and have clean water to drink, shower, or wash clothes, when so many in the world do not.

We are thankful that with a flick of a switch we have light or heat when so many have neither.

We are thankful for roofs over our heads, warm beds to sleep in, and a place to call home when numbers of those experiencing homelessness are climbing everywhere.

We are thankful to be part of an organization that works to serve others and to make our little corner of the world a better place.

Holy God:

Help us to remember to respond to your generosity mindful that we are created in your image and likeness. Help us to make love our pandemic of choice: make us vectors of infectious love.

Where these times sow fear and insecurity, help us to sow faith, hope and joy.

Make us your instruments of justice, grace and mercy.

Rid us of judgmental attitudes and replenish our reservoirs of compassion.

Help us to live safely; reveal to us new and creative ways to come together in spirit and in solidarity.

We pray that you would also keep us in good spirits, as we feel the colder weather coming, And as we contend with the reality of rising infection rates ... please keep us in your care. We pray in the name of Jesus. Amen.
