May 10 2020 – Fifth Sunday of Easter

Prelude: Brad on our organ from church – these notes are from Brad on this piece:

"Liebster Jesu, wir sind hier". is a chorale prelude by Bach on a very familiar hymn tune we sing, typically at baptisms. However, I have often played it as a reflective prelude on any given Sunday to quietly make an association to our baptism (Dearest Jesus, We Are Here, elw443). The composition reveals Bach pushing the limits of acceptable dissonance in his day and even to our modern ears it is challenging. The tune is heard in the top voice but also in a middle voice trailing along at a different pitch. The math (science) at work here is very much akin to something being in two different places at the same time. As a spiritual gathering of people we are well placed to ponder such possibilities.

The Holy Gospel according to John 14:1-14.

C: Glory to you O Lord.

"Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. And you know the way to the place where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him." Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, "Show us the Father'? The Reading: 2 Peter 2:1-12

So clean house! Make a clean sweep of malice and pretense, envy and hurtful talk. You've had a taste of God. Now, like infants at the breast, drink deep of God's pure kindness. Then you'll grow up mature and whole in God.

Welcome to the living Stone, the source of life. The workmen took one look and threw it out; God set it in the place of honor. Present yourselves as building stones for the construction of a sanctuary vibrant with life, in which you'll serve as holy priests offering Christ-approved lives up to God. The Scriptures provide precedent:

Look! I'm setting a stone in Zion, a cornerstone in the place of honor. Whoever trusts in this stone as a foundation will never have cause to regret it.

To you who trust him, he's a Stone to be proud of, but to those who refuse to trust him,

The stone the workmen threw out is now the chief foundation stone.

For the untrusting it's . . . a stone to trip over, a boulder blocking the way.

They trip and fall because they refuse to obey, just as predicted.

But you are the ones chosen by God, chosen for the high calling of priestly work, chosen to be a holy people, God's instruments to do his work and speak out for him, to tell others of the night-and-day difference he made for you—from nothing to something, from rejected to accepted.

Friends, this world is not your home, so don't make yourselves cozy in it. Don't indulge your ego at the expense of your soul. Live an exemplary life among the natives so that your actions will refute their prejudices. Then they'll be won over to God's side and be there to join in the celebration when he arrives. [The Message Translation]

Word of God, word of life. C: Thanks be to God.

Sermon (imagine Pastor Janaki's voice here):

In a worship building that is no longer in use for that purpose, in 2012, when I was in

seminary, I remember standing shoulder to shoulder with a number of youth, swaying gently and singing these words: "Lord prepare me to be a sanctuary, pure and holy, tried and true ... With thanksgiving, I'll be a living sanctuary for you ... "

There was something in those words that moved me to a flow of tears and I think it was the request, indeed the commitment, for my personhood to be a place where God would take up residence. It was early in my journey of preparation for ministry, and so often (then, as now) I feel inadequately equipped ... but on a good day I remember that it is not who or what I am, but what God does in, with and through me that equips me to be that sanctuary. And for that I am thankful – because, left to my own devices this would not happen; we are, each and every one of us, equipped by Divine providence to be a sanctuary.

The worship building in which I sang those words and shed those tears is no longer a worship building – it was the main chapel at Camp Edgewood. But the incapacity for Camp Edgewood to continue being a viable outdoor ministry does not, as we know, mean that outdoor ministry ceased. Camp became a different experience entirely ... and for a number of years, our kids from St Peter's have gone to camp even though Edgewood closed.

For these many weeks, though our church building doors have been closed for gatherings, you who have been faithfully reading the services and following the worship music and prayers have been placing yourself in that servant frame of mind to become a sanctuary for God. If you are reading this and you are a Christian, Jesus is the cornerstone, the head cornerstone of the sanctuary you seek to become. And one of the most incredible things to me about our faith is this: no matter who we are or how we are, if we present ourselves as building stones for the construction of a sanctuary vibrant with life, we will not be rejected by God, but made new in Christ to become part of this church whose doors never close, and whose blessings know no limit.

When we trust in Jesus as the way-maker, the head cornerstone, we will never have to regret it. And you, "you are the ones chosen by God, chosen for the high calling of priestly work, chosen to be a holy people, God's instruments to do his work and speak out for him, to tell others of the night-and-day difference he made for you—from nothing to something, from rejected to accepted." This first letter from Peter does not require a whole lot of unpacking, and it speaks to us individually as well as collectively. The opening of the letter addresses the very issue of separation and distance – and Jesus who brings us together:

"I, Peter, am an apostle on assignment by Jesus, the Messiah, writing to exiles scattered to the four winds. Not one is missing, not one forgotten. God the Father has his eye on each of you, and has determined by the work of the Spirit to keep you obedient through the sacrifice of Jesus. May everything good from God be yours!" (1 Peter 1:1-2).

During this time of separation from each other, what has God said to you? How has God spoken to you through the isolation, through the news of death, through the fear and through the anxiety? Do you feel prepared to trust that it will be safe to re-enter into each other's company? Do you feel it is necessary? Do you want to go there (yet)?

I ask this because as we begin to hear news of things re-opening, we will all have anxieties and reservations, perhaps mingled with the excitement of things returning to some kind of normal. But it will not be the same normal we had before COVID-19. I am confident that, when we get past the lockdown phase of the COVID-19 pandemic, many, many things will have changed.

One of the things I have tried to remain very open to, is the possibilities and indeed the opportunities for changes in how we live our lives as the church of Jesus Christ. Not as the congregation of St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Cambridge, but as the body of Jesus, who individually and collectively, usher in the Kingdom of God – each one of us opening up ourselves to be a building stone for the construction of a sanctuary that houses God – whether we feel ready to return to worship gatherings or not. I want to encourage you to allow yourselves to be open to how God may call upon you to be a sanctuary, and know it may not look the way being faithful has looked in the past. Do not be afraid of the old ways that may not be part of the new normal, because we are being remade daily by God: Father, Son and Spirit, who work in, with and through us to allow the no longer needed, the unnecessary, the false idols, the facades – allow them all to fall away and die, so that our resurrection may be possible as the living sanctuary of God.
