This Sunday's gospel lectionary is has two lovely readings for the second half of our "returning the tools of ministry" service ... the epistle reading from 1 John 4 reminds us that "if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us." The Gospel reading, from John 15, in turn reminds us that Jesus is "the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing."

Rather than having a regular sermon this Sunday, we hear from those who agreed to receive the tools of ministry I have returned. This marks our last Sunday together as pastor and congregation, following my announcement of resignation on April 11th. When we finish worship today, my tenure as your pastor ends, and I commend you to the care of the church's lay leaders and our Synod who will, together, ensure that your pastoral care needs are met.

The Lesson: 1 John 4:7-21

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit.

And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them.

Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also. [NRSV]

The Holy Gospel according to John 15:1-8 *C: Glory to you, O God.*

[Jesus said]

"I am the Real Vine and my Father is the Farmer. He cuts off every branch of me that doesn't bear grapes. And every branch that is grape-bearing he prunes back so it will bear even more. You are already pruned back by the message I have spoken.

"Live in me. Make your home in me just as I do in you. In the same way that a branch can't bear grapes by itself but only by being joined to the vine, you can't bear fruit unless you are joined with me.

"I am the Vine, you are the branches. When you're joined with me and I with you, the relation intimate and organic, the harvest is sure to be abundant. Separated, you can't produce a thing. Anyone who separates from me is deadwood, gathered up and thrown on the bonfire. But if you make yourselves at home with me and my words are at home in you, you can be sure that whatever you ask will be listened to and acted upon. This is how my Father shows who he is—when you produce grapes, when you mature as my disciples.

This is the Gospel of our Saviour, Jesus. C: Thanks be to Christ.*

Message (Imagine multiple voiced here ⁽²⁾)

I cannot remember whether I have shared this story with you before, and I cannot resist the opportunity to share one more story with you and it relates to grape vines so it relates to the gospel reading!! Here goes:

When I moved to my house in Cambridge, my garden was overgrown with some kind of wild grape. This ambitious and persistent vine reached to the very top of a very tall evergreen in my back yard, covered much of the fence, and happily precluded the flowering and fruiting of everything that it used to climb.

Interestingly, it bore very little fruit, seeming to be all too preoccupied with taking over my backyard (or the world maybe??). I tried to haul the green vines off the trees they were attacking, and that proved to be a (pardon the pun) fruitless effort! But I quickly learnt that if I crawled around and cut those vines off at the ground, and gave the upward-creeping segments a day or two (or a week or two) to die off, I could pull them down and twist them into handy loops which, when dried, burned quite nicely in my little hibachi.

By this means, some tasty meaty treats were barbequed on grape vines \odot

It seems to me that Jesus in the Gospel reading today is very familiar with this kind of megalomaniac-takeover-the-world type vine that covers and smothers everything but does not bear; is not productive. Jesus is quick to declare in today's gospel reading that HE is the real vine, and that God will not only cut off the fruitless parts of the vine, but will also prune back the grape-bearing segments – in order to promote even heartier productivity!

I promise you I did not pick this scripture for today! It was indeed the lectionary!!

And how appropriate it feels, that Jesus affirms the cutting back of even the grape-bearing segments to promote heartier productivity. So, today, as we celebrate our last Sunday in this call to ministry for me with you all, I encourage you to think of this as a heavenly pruning back from which MORE productive witness, MORE fruitful ministry, MORE nourishing growth will come from each and every one of you (finger wag)!

There is no excuse for complacency. We are allowed to miss each other and feel sad. AND ... AND we are called to remain connected to the VINE which is Jesus, and We are pruned back to bear more fruit for the Kingdom of God ⁽²⁾ Don't let me be hearing otherwise!!

So, on that note, I will call upon the disciples who received the tools of ministry, to speak to the items they return and what it means for them and for you as a congregation:

Lorre and Marlen's pottery insert for the font: "I receive the baptismal bowl representing our ministry together as baptized children of God. Only God could take something as simple as water and make it into something so precious and sacred. Many, if not most of us, were baptized as babies or very young children and we only remember our baptisms through family photos taken on that occasion. Pastor Janaki, you were baptized as an adult and because of that you brought a new appreciation of being welcomed into God's family to the rest of us. The excitement, enthusiasm, and inclusivity you wove into each and every baptismal sacrament you presided over was joyous, genuine, and dare I say it in these pandemic times, infectious. Because of the joy and gratitude, you felt from your own baptism, I have come to appreciate my own cleansing in the holy waters so many years ago and I have come to more fully embrace it as a true gift from God. So, no matter where you go or what path your journey in ministry takes, we will always be members of the same family of God. We are reminded by the familiar words from our service of Holy Baptism that '**We** belong to Christ, in whom **we** have been baptized."

Brad and the apple shaker: I receive this shaker and give thanks for the unique opportunity I experienced with Pastor Janaki in finding such a great listener with whom I could share my experiences concerning the role of music in worship. Our music making is a living language that gives us a way to breath as one and binds us together in love. Soli Deo.

Sherri and Bible Study: Some of my fondest memories of St Peter's during this past six years are of having heartfelt discussions and sometimes hearty laughter during our Bible Study classes. It is my honour to accept this Bible. I will keep and protect it until Bible studies resume once more.

Heide and Learning Ministries: "I receive this Lenten Study Booklet "More than a Sunday Christian" representing our learning ministry together. Knowing that our congregation had decided to describe our church as having a "Worship and Learning" focus, Pastor Janaki, you took great care in choosing, preparing and guiding us through a variety learning opportunities which focussed on putting into real life action, our mission statement: *To be an engaged community of Jesus, energized to intentionally share the light of God throughout our daily living.*

Your thought-provoking worship services, so beautifully wove together the readings, prayer, and sermon with Brad's musical support. Your carefully chosen impeccable words challenged me to be more mindful of my thoughts, words and actions.

By facilitating book studies such as *The Gifts of Imperfection* and *Daring Greatly* by Brene Brown, *The Powers that Be* by Walter Wink and *WITH: Reimagining the Way you Relate to God* by Skye Jethani, you encouraged us to dig deep into our present beliefs, to make changes where the spirit guided us to, to step up and truly be light in this world.

You supported VBS, and took an active role each year not only in leading prayers, but in taking time to walk and talk with all participants.

Further, you encouraged us to step outside our comfort zones and put our faith into action by *offering opportunities* to serve each other, to love each other, to forgive each other, and not judge each other, AND to do the same for those unlike ourselves.

AND then you went a step further, and actually demonstrated through your actions, being light in the world by asking for and offering forgiveness, being non-judgement, seeing the good in all, serving us, and also by serving those less fortunate at our picnic table, at Bridges and the Self Help Food Bank, and now in your new employment with Threshold. By journeying WITH.

I feel that my spiritual growth has become "unstuck" in these past years under your pastoral leadership, and for this I am truly grateful. In behalf of our congregation, I receive this Lenten Study Booklet, "More than a Sunday Christian" with intention that we also journey WITH each other and beyond our comfort, to share the light of God."

Jann on behalf of Jann and Bonnie with the Keys – administration – "Pastor Janaki, when you finished seminary, you had no way of knowing 'where you would' be placed as a pastor, but God in all his glory did – he has a plan for you. Your circumstance reminded me of a poem by Roy Lessin, entitled 'Just Think', and I quote:

To that end, we thank you for the years of ministry that you have shared with us, for your leadership, for your compassion and guidance, for your kindness and never-failing presence, for your service, for your generosity of time, for your unconditional love. Aaron Berg for Confirmation ministry: I receive this hymnal as representation of confirmation ministries. Confirmation is what really cements our personal and congregational relationship with God. Through the vows, we accept and publicly proclaim the promises and values that our parents made for us at our baptism. Pastor Janaki has always guided me and other confirmands through the process of learning what confirmation means as well as how to be a functioning and independent Christian throughout our lives. With Pastor Janaki's careful attention, the St. Peter's youth have had the opportunity to meet and bond, and she has provided the means for which Youth Ministry may continue by lighting a spark in the congregation. Pastor Janaki's generosity with her time has extended beyond St. Peter's church into the community, as well. This represents so much more than just a box of tissues. When my son Malekai and I first came to St Peter's about 3 years ago, we were welcomed with love and kindness. So what this tool of ministry represents is a welcoming. A welcoming of tears both of joy and sorrow from the very youngest to the eldest. Whether receiving pastoral support or listening to a service, this tool was never out of reach, and neither shall we be out of reach from each other. It represents the love and kindness we've always received and will continue to receive from each other. Thank you.

All these tools of ministry which we have used together so often, are now yours – you are the branches of the main vine which is Jesus ... you are the fruit bearers ... you, each and every one of you, is called: to be witness, to be servant,

to be Christ to each other ... to journey together as pilgrims in the Kingdom to share in the joy and suffering that is part of being this Body of Christ. God be with you in the journey [©]
