The First Reading: Esther 7:1-6, 9-10; 9:20-22

So the king and Haman went in to feast with Queen Esther. On the second day, as they were drinking wine, the king again said to Esther, "What is your petition, Queen Esther? It shall be granted you. And what is your request? Even to the half of my kingdom, it shall be fulfilled." Then Queen Esther answered, "If I have won your favor, O king, and if it pleases the king, let my life be given me — that is my petition — and the lives of my people — that is my request. For we have been sold, I and my people, to be destroyed, to be killed, and to be annihilated. If we had been sold merely as slaves, men and women, I would have held my peace; but

no enemy can compensate for this damage to the king." Then King Ahasuerus said to Queen Esther, "Who is he, and where is he, who has presumed to do this?" Esther said, "A foe and enemy, this wicked Haman!" Then Haman was terrified before the king and the queen. Then Harbona, one of the eunuchs in attendance on the king, said, "Look, the very gallows that Haman has prepared for Mordecai, whose word saved the king, stands at Haman's house, fifty cubits high." And the king said, "Hang him on that." So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the anger of the king abated.

Mordecai recorded these things, and sent letters to all the Jews who were in all the provinces of King Ahasuerus, both near and far, enjoining them that they should keep the fourteenth day of the month Adar and also the fifteenth day of the same month, year by year, as the days on which the Jews gained relief from their enemies, and as the month that had been turned for them from sorrow into gladness and from mourning into a holiday; that they should make them days of feasting and gladness, days for sending gifts of food to one another and presents to the poor. The Holy Gospel according to Mark 9:38-50

C: Glory to you, O Lord.

John said to Jesus, "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." But Jesus said, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us. For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward.

"If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched.

"For everyone will be salted with fire. Salt is good; but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another." (NRSV)

The Gospel of the Lord. C: Praise to you, O Christ.*

<u>Sermon</u> (Imagine Supply Pastor Barry Boeckner's voice here)

"Our Hero Wears Prada", (P. Barry Boeckner)

As I begin the sermon this morning I want to be open about my choice of Esther as both the alternate Old Testament reading and the subject of the sermon this morning. It's still Covid. After almost 2 whole years with normal still a moving target, it seemed to me that we need some inspiration, an uplifting passage, something, or better still, someone to look up to, as a model and an example. We've been doing this with lawn signs, I'm sure you've all seen on a lawn or on TV the sign, "Our heroes wear scrubs", in praise of the nurses and orderlies with baggy uniforms that care for our sick and dying. So, this morning I want to present the story of our own hero, Esther.

But, a strange, or not so strange thing happened on the way to this sermon. As is the case when one sits with the Word of God in scriptures, we open the book, but then the Word in the book opens us. And after we have run out of questions to ask the text, the text starts asking questions of us. So much so that by the time we think we are done with the text, the text is not done with us. For you see, I would have to say, after reading the whole story of Esther, and sitting with it, I will have to say that our hero, Queen Esther wears Prada, dresses in Christian Dior outfits and bathes in Chanel #5. No scrubs on her.

But I'm getting ahead of myself, so I would urge you to read the whole thing. Only 10 chapters but she gets a whole book to herself, bearing her own name. You will find, if you read it all, that Esther is an unlikely religious hero. She is a young woman of rare beauty, a real looker, a stunner. She is Prom Queen material. And as well as her natural endowments she gets special treatment as a young woman. Her promise of picturesque beauty is immediately rewarded with 7 maids, that's right, 7 attendants, to brush her hair, do her nails, draw her baths. And then, to make sure she makes the most of her natural endowments she gets spa treatment, But not a week in the beauty spa, not even a month but a whole year of spa treatments, first 6 months bathing with oil of myrhh, and then another 6 months of spices and perfume and ointments for milady. And she wins. King Ahasuerus sees her amidst a bevy of beauties and the Prom Queen becomes the real queen, Queen over all of Persia and Media, standing at the King's side as his chosen wife. You see, there had to be a beauty contest because the first wife of the King had refused to be a chattel, a piece of property and asked to have her own voice. So she had to be replaced, and Esther replaces her.

But as you could perhaps have guessed, the life of a beauty queen is not her own life. She is eye candy for the King. Would it be too mean to say she is a toy, a sex toy for the King. I don't want to be crude here, so let me leave it with a question. When the King summons his gorgeous wife, do you think it is to talk about politics and the power balance in Katmadu or maybe the price of oil shares in the mid-East? I think you get the drift here. She serves at the King's pleasure, she is an ornament, an object, incredibly, stunningly beautiful but she has no voice of her own. She will speak when she is spoken to. Like the King's favorite chariot, or favorite sword or favorite horse, she waits to be summoned.

This is what reminded me so much of our own times of Covid. Covid reigns. It determines where we go, who we go with and how long we stay. Our life is scarcely our own. What we want counts for little. It's what the pandemic rules and precautions dictate. Things are getting better and we will get back to normal but we're not there yet and it will likely be a new normal. In some ways, like Esther we don't have much of a say in how things will go. And Covid for now is the mandate we must serve. In many ways our voices don't count. We are much like Esther. For many of us, most of us, we are safe in our more-than-adequate homes but like Esther we live in a gilded cage.

But that's not the end of the story for here the story turns. Meanwhile, back at the palace. Back at the palace, there is a secret plot being hatched by a bad guy. Mordecai is Esther's adopted father, and he has offended Haman, one of the King's advisers. On a trumped up accusation, nasty Haman gets the King to give him power of life and death over Mordecai and his Jewish citizens. Oh, and by the way, did you know Queen Esther had a secret. The Prom Queen is a liar; she did not disclose to the King that she is a Jewess. Well, Haman succeeds is getting the King to give him permission to choke off the fake threat to the crown, which means Haman is free to execute Mordecai and all the people of God as well.

In despair, Mordecai turns for help to his daughter, the Prom Queen, now the Kingdom Queen. And he lays the dilemma before her in plain words. Remember, the queen cannot go to the king and speak, she can only speak when he asks her to. So Mordecai says, "if you keep silence at such a time as this you and your father's house will perish...." (First half of verse 14, c. 4). And there is no plea from Mordecai to is daughter, "You've got to...." And no request, "Will you..." There is just an open ended thought, a tentative few words, but they hang in the air heavy as the queen's precious perfume, "And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" In other words, maybe this is your golden hour, but it's up to you. "And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"

What next? We're not told a lot about Esther's inner thoughts, what's going on in her mind, the words she forms, the pictures and images that torment her. Much like Jesus praying in the garden of Gethsemane. All we hear is "if this cup cannot pass from me... nevertheless, not my will but yours be done"

What we do know is that like Jesus Esther chooses to fast. In her case it is 3 days, in Jesus case it was 40 days in the wilderness. This is the way of discernment. Of turning away from one's own needs to ask what God wants, to seek the will, the way of God. And Esther finds her voice by seeking God's voice. This is Samuel saying, "Speak Lord, for your servant is listening." This is Mary saying to the angel, "I am the Lord's handmaid, let it be to me as you have said." Esther finds the power of surrendering to God's voice, God's will, God's way. And she obediently seeks out the King, unbidden, to ask for him to let her people go.

This discerning God's will is not easy and I hope I'm not making it sound like that.

Discerning God's will is even tricky. Let me give you an example, from a Zoom I took part in this week. There were over a dozen of us, and as we checked in during Covid I heard people saying things like, "It's been a good week. My family is good, my health is good, it's good to see you all, the church is going good' And no one but one person reported in with the words, God is good. Only one, and by the way this Zoom was pastors only. So often when we in the church seek to discern our future, we consult our own dreams, what

we want. Rather than saying those key words, God, what would you have me do? If that's all you carry away from the sermon, that would be it for me. To ask, frequently and faithfully, Look God, W W Y H M D, What Would You Have Me Do?

In the end Queen Esther wins by surrendering to what God wants for her to do. I know, surrender to us means defeat, being on the losing side. But for her and for all people of faith, surrender to God is a turning point. Surrender conveys the joyful power of freedom from fear, in order to serve God. And there can be nothing more precious than surrendered souls in the Kingdom.

I have seen it written in a novel that for anyone to rise to the occasion and to make a special accomplishment of their life, they must first find something special within themselves. For the longest time Esther found within herself only beauty skin deep and it looked as if that would be the secret to her great accomplishment. But then she looked deeper within herself and found surrender to God as her special quality and that led to an even greater victory over hatred and darkness and death.

We may none of us ever be as good looking or as highly favoured as Esther but we can all lay claim to her power of surrendering to our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, and likewise know the wild and wonderful freedom of the Kingdom come. Amen.
